## Oregon Area Voting Procedures

A motion is made:

If it does not receive a second, it dies. After a second, debate is opened. If a registered voter calls for the question, a second will be required, or debate resumes.

A question must be called in turn at the mike.

If the question is seconded a 2/3 majority will end the debate, or debate resumes.

If the question is not called, debate will go on until there is no one at the mike. Once debate ends, a sense of the group will be taken by simple majority, to vote or table.

A motion is voted on:

If it involves expenditure of area funds, the finance committee will be asked to report. It requires a 2/3 majority to pass.

The losing side will be asked if they wish to speak to their position. The winning side will be asked if there is a motion to re-vote, and requires a second. A simple majority is required to re-vote.

A motion is reconsidered:

Full debate, pro and con is resumed (please limit discussion to only new considerations).

The question may again be called, seconded, and requires a 2/3 majority to end debate.

A sense of the group may be taken by simple majority, to vote or table.

If voted on, the motion must have a 2/3 majority to pass.

Debate has ended.

Debate on a tabled motion will be resumed under old business at the next assembly, and the voting process will be the same as above.

### **Old Business**

#### ***Tabled Motion #4:***

Submitted by Dist. 4

**Motion:** Change the current practice so that the Area Delegate will not automatically transfer into the Grapevine/La Vina chair position when rotating from the Delegate position, effective at the next Delegate position rotation. . *(This motion was amended from the original version)*

**Intent/Purpose:** Prior to the motion passed at the September 2004 assembly, funding was not offered to Past Delegates wishing to attend and participate at all Area Service Assemblies Since that time, it is no longer necessary to rotate the Delegate into a chair position to provide funding. After what normally is an eight-year service commitment to Area in a position which requires significant travel and responsibilities, the Delegate would be free to choose their next position of service. We would highly encourage Past Delegates to attend our assemblies so as to participate in events such as the "Ask It Basket," and such, but, more importantly, to be available for questions and guidance during the business meeting.

By opening the position of Grapevine/La Vina Chair to the selection process already in place whereby the Area Chairperson reviews service resumes and then chooses the person best for the position, the position would be filled by a person who is more likely to be enthusiastic and uniquely suited for the job. The Grapevine/La Vina position deserves a Chair who can and is able to give it 100%.

**Financial Impact:** Hopefully, with full participation by the Past Delegate at assemblies, an increased cost of \$600 annually.

#### **Discussion:**

Murray M. pointed out that this motion stops the automatic rotation and allows the Delegate the choice of whether or not they wish to stand for the position.

Eric K. said he was not in favor of this motion and said he would like to hear from the past delegates on how they feel about this. But he would be in acceptance either way this motion goes.

Robin wanted to know who would fill the position if the past delegate can't or doesn't want to?

Murray said that this would become a rotating position available to anyone who wishes to put in a resume for it.

Don J. (Past Delegate) said he was in favor of things remaining the same because he felt the automatic rotation kept the Past Delegates involved with the Area and he liked doing the job as Grapevine Representative.

Helen M. (Past Delegate) said it was her experience strength and hope that this was a great opportunity and an easy letdown from area service. She said they don't want brand new past delegates at the Elder Statesman's table because they would need to chain them to the table to keep them from the mike. Besides Delegates can give insights about the Grapevine that others cannot due to their recent experience with the General Service Conference.

Scott said he was in favor of this motion because rotation is a spiritual principal and that if they don't automatically get to be Grapevine Chair they should just let it go and move on so someone else can do it.

Wayne said he was in favor because sometimes the lack of enthusiasm shows in their performance of duties in the position. Not mandating this position will put someone in who wants to do it and will give it their best effort.

Ron W. called the question.

Debate was ended.

A vote was taken and the motion and it was too close to call by observation so a tally was taken and the vote was 104 yes and 93 no. There was no majority so **the motion failed.**

### **Minority opinion**

Wayne wanted to know how we could not be for this motion? This motion allows for more rotation. If the Delegate wants it they can have it if they don't they don't have to. It's a win-win situation.

Another member said they thought this should pass as there are evident problems with the enthusiasm level of past delegates for this position.

A member said they wanted the opportunity to serve in this position available to more than just past delegates.

Someone pointed out that the past delegates should probably go work with the archivist if they want to be of the best service.

Someone pointed out that no one should be forced to do anything in AA

Bruce pointed out that this will not be a voted position but rather one appointed by the chair.

The body voted not to revote and **the motion stands as Failed.**

### ***Tabled Motion #6:***

Submitted by Districts 11 & 25

(Gresham, Sandy and Welches: DCMs- Robin W. & Chris D.)

**Motion:** That the Oregon Area Guidelines for awarding future assemblies is changed to allow for a longer 'lead-time' in awarding bids. Bids could be awarded up to two-years-in-advance.

*(This motion was amended from the original version)*

### **Intent & Purpose:**

As Quarterly Assembly numbers continue to rise, larger facilities are needed. Awarding bids further in advance could insure that host-districts can reserve such facilities before other organizations do so.

### **Current Practice:**

The Oregon Area awards bids on Quarterly Assemblies one-year-in-advance for November, February and May and 16-months-in-advance for September.

### **Financial Impact:**

Unknown – Could result in Oregon Area 'seed money' expenditures to host-Districts being out of the treasury for longer periods of time.

### **Discussion:**

Steve W. asked whether this was stipulated in the guidelines.

Anne said that that was a problem because the guidelines are a little fuzzy on this. Last time the issue came up she took a sense of the meeting and the body voted against awarding it so soon.

Chris said that this will give bidding committees enough time to secure a more popular facility.

Discussion ended.

A vote was taken and **the motion Passed.**

### **Minority Opinion**

Steve said that this motion will take away the opportunity for many bidding committees to get a chance to bid in time for an assembly.

Chris said he was opposed because this doesn't fix anything that is broken. Committees will burn out in this long a timeframe.

Bill asked for clarification. Exactly when would the deadline for bids be set if this passes?

Anne said she thought it would still be one year but that she could accept a bid up to 2 years in advance. The decision whether to accept the bid would still be up to the chair.

Wayne said he didn't understand the need.

Richard said he wanted Chase's input on the impact but was told that would be out of order as this was for minority opinions only.

The body voted not to revote and **the motion stands as passed.**

### ***Tabled Motion #9:***

Submitted by Dist. 18

**Motion:** To amend the Oregon Area Guidelines to require tabling of motions of over \$500, except for money to be paid back within a year. *(This motion was amended from its original version)*

**Intent/Purpose:** The intent of this motion is to require all motions over \$500 to be automatically tabled for review by the groups. A specific waiver for this would be monies that are to be reimbursed within a one year period, i.e., for seed money to assemblies. This motion would force the Assembly to allow the groups to decide on large amounts of money to be spent, as the groups are the ultimate authority.

**Current Practice:** A motion is made; it is left to the consensus of the meeting to determine if the item is urgent or administrative. There is no limit to the amount of money to be spent.

**Budgetary Impact:** This would allow for greater ability for the Oregon Area to budget for high expenses.

**Discussion:**

Eric said this motion while it was well-intentioned, it was ill-advised. It would increase the number of take backs to the groups and cause a terrible bottleneck in the process thus limiting our ability to conduct business. We are responsible and should act accordingly.

Dale said she was against this motion because it micromanages our trusted servants. We already have the opportunity to table motions. GSRs are given the right of decision by the groups and this would circumvent that. Ray R. said he was against this motion because it handicaps the process ,financial motions need more flexibility. Murray said he was against it because we had already witnessed where the archivist needed more than \$500 to attend the archives convention. This would have made him miss a valuable event.

Steve said that he thought that this motion would have had a place in about 1950 but today a cup of coffee costs close to \$500.

Nancy called the question.

A vote was taken and **the motion failed.**

**Minority Opinion**

Fran C. said even though their district put forth this motion they are not upset that it failed because at least it made us stop and think about the process and think about how quickly we vote to spend large sums of money.

Cathleen said she thought this amount of money was beyond operating expenses. She thought that a quick decision decreases the commitment to sobriety and the groups.

Teffany said it was her observation that we often vote too quickly on large sums of money.

Another member said they were on the fence and felt that this motion would have passed with a slightly higher figure.

The body voted not to revote and **the motion stands as failed.**

**Tabled Motion #11:**

Submitted by District 7, Area 58 (Grants Pass)

**Motion:** Oregon Area 58 shall pay the current average cost for our delegate to go to the General Service Conference to the General Service Office of Alcoholics Anonymous.

*(This motion was amended from its original version)*

**Intent/Purpose:** Although GSO does not require us to do so, Oregon Area 58 has the resources to be fully self-supporting in accord with our 7<sup>th</sup> tradition. We have the funds, so let us utilize them. The fact that the GSO is currently operating with around a million dollar annual deficit brought this question to mind, though we think paying our own way should be standard practice. If in the future self-support is inadvisable, motions can be made to address the situation.

**Financial Impact:** We suggest that an initial contribution of \$4500 be sent to GSO with the balance settled afterward. Average cost of attendance is \$4500 taken from records over the past 5 years.

**Current Practice:** Oregon Area 58 contributes \$2000 annually with the rest of the cost paid by GSO.

**Discussion:**

Steve asked for clarification, does this mandate priority over other expenses?

Scott said he thought this would apply to times when we had the money. First we pay our bills and then we do this.

Chris said we should support our delegate.

Paul asked whether we were self-supporting or not?

Eric said we were a strong, active and able Area that can afford to do this!

The finance committee pointed out that this motion was a one-time thing and that this would just be done for this year.

The question was called.

A vote was taken and **the motion passed.**

**Minority Opinion**

Lizz said she thought this figure was too high and that she only spent \$3000 on her trip to the General Service Office.

Steve said that he was hung up on a technicality that this was really a motion that reads for all time and doesn't stipulate a yearly review of the topic.

Another member concurred.

Doug said that we were already contributing to the GSO and this would constitute double dipping.

Martha said the recurrence of this expense commitment is a dangerous precedent. She felt there were things to watch out for in this motion that it was vague and locks us into an amount of money we may not always have available.

Gus said he was under the impression that this motion had been amended on site and that we could not do that. We cannot alter a line item on the budget without approval of the body.

The body voted not to revote and **the motion stands as passed.**

***Tabled motion #14:***

Submitted by Dave A.

**Motion:** That the Oregon Area hold a one day Area Committee Orientation on a Saturday in January of each year at a centrally located meeting place. Funding for the Area Orientation will be provided by the Area's annual budget for the appropriate year. The maximum expenditure for any given annual orientation will not exceed \$1,000.

**Intent and Purpose:** To provide an orientation for new Area Officers, Service Committee members and DCMs similar to a GSR school. Past Area Trusted servants who have served in these positions will be selected by the Area Chair to develop a program and lead the orientation. The final program will be approved by the Area Chair and reviewed from time to time by the full Area Committee (Officers, Service Committee members and DCMs). There will be no business conducted and no voting of any kind at the annual orientation.

**Current Practice:** The Area currently holds a GSR School at all area assemblies and at other times as requested by groups and districts. The GSR School is prepared by and coordinated by the Alternate Delegate. There is no formal training for orientation provided for any Area Officer, Service Committee member or DCM. The Area Committee sharing session at Area assemblies is used for discussing Area issues and concerns and not the time when experienced members can train and orient newer members. Knowledge and experience of a member who is rotating out is, therefore, not consistently passed on to the next trusted servant. A three to four hour training for Area Officers/Service Committee members and the same for DCMs would provide incoming members with detailed information about their budgets, how to reach out to Districts and groups to assist them in carrying the message, knowledge about the commitment in terms of time and travel required, where and when to be during Assemblies to be of maximum service, and an overall review of the Area service structure, just to name a few topics already suggested. Whereas a GSR school is held at each assembly to accommodate the continuous turnover of GSRs, the Area Committees and Officers rotate in November only. A once yearly orientation would be more appropriate for these trusted servants. January was selected as a time that would not normally conflict with other Area events and when new members would be getting started in their positions. An inexpensive meeting place in a

central location such as Salem or Eugene would be pursued.

**Budgetary Impact:** A maximum of \$1,000 per year.

**Discussion:**

Dave said he polled other Pacific areas and they were for it.

Another member said they were for this motion. We need to step up to the plate.

Chris said this would prevent us from dropping the ball and allows for the passing of information.

Anne said past experience says this is a must.

Teffany said she was for this motion.

The question was called.

A vote was taken and **the motion passed**.

**Minority Opinion:**

Matthew said he loves the concept but would like to see this held in conjunction with another event to streamline expenses.

Brenda said she wasn't in favor because some places would not be able to attend.

A member said that they were not in favor because it was too expensive.

The body voted to revote but **the motion stands as passed**.

**Tabled motion #15:**

Submitted by District 16

**Motion:** That Alcoholics Anonymous create a pamphlet concerning Bipolar Disorder and Alcoholism.

**Intent and Purpose:** To inform AA members of a potential link between Alcoholism and Bipolar Disorder.

“There is the manic depressive type who is, perhaps, the least understood by his friends, and about whom a whole chapter could be written.” – *The Doctor's Opinion, Alcoholics Anonymous*, p. xxx

**Current Practice:** No general information, non-diagnostic in nature, is currently available citing the possible relationship between Bipolar Disorder and Alcoholism.

**Financial Impact:** Estimates of costs will be taken into consideration pending AA General Service Conference approval.

**Discussion:**

Chris said he was not in favor because it was too specific and would open up AA to have to print a whole lot of different pamphlets on every existing mental disorder.

Tami said she was against this because her group felt it singled out Bi-polar disorder as “special”.

Palu said he too felt it was too specific.

Ray called the question.

The body voted to vote and **the motion failed**.

**Minority Opinion:**

Dave said it was not up to us to dicker over its feasibility that we should just send it up and let GSO decide.

A member said that we need this because members are dying due to the fact that they do not feel accepted with this disorder.

Chris said he felt this was a necessary tool.

Another member said they would really like to see what GSO would do with the idea.

Jack said this was just the attitude that makes people suicidal over this issue.

A member said that we need to educate people in AA that we are not doctors!

Martha said that as a sponsor she feels a need for this as a tool to understand sponsees with this disorder.

The body voted to revote but **the motion stands as failed.**

**DELEGATE REPORT   Eric K.   11/19/06**

I hope you will all take the, "Delegate Handout" and act on it... as soon you are able. Recently I had a powerful service experience of a variety that many of you have also had. But then, I gave into a temptation that has been a part of my troubled and negative thinking since my earliest memories. I found myself paying more attention to what I couldn't have... than being grateful for what I did have. In this particular case, I took note that I had in my hand a flyer for a Traditions Play in Roseburg, District 13, on November 4th. I had missed it. It would have been fun to be there. And November 11th coming up... the world famous Oyster Feed in Hermiston... District 3! And I'm going to miss that, too! And do I go to the PRAASA meeting or should I accept that invitation to be one of three speakers at a meeting inside the walls at OSCI?

Now, I know better than that. Eric, pay attention to the gift... of what shows up in your life... and be unconcerned about what is not there. Don't think so much of the sponsee that chose to go back to drinking... as the potential new member... there, standing by the door... trying to decide if he should come in.

Six years ago, I attended my first GSR School... just a few miles from here. Of the eight people who showed up, only one person was not a member of the panel or serving as part of the Area Committee. The DCM of the sponsoring district apologized for the low turn out. But Mark S., our former Delegate and Chairperson of the Area, reassured the worried DCM by encouraging him to be unconcerned about how many showed up. He said, "I was told not to count them, just tend them." Mark went on to tailor his message that day... to that one newcomer to general service, and in so doing, made a demonstration that has helped me a great deal in my life of service.

So there I was, worrying about all the opportunities I was missing, as I try to fit everything in... service, career, marriage, home group, physical exercise, eating healthy, rest and sleep. And what was I failing to feel good about? Something that happened on October 29th. It was a Sunday. I woke up that morning and thought to myself, "Today is my last Post-Conference Report. I'm rested and ready. It is going to be a great day!" Now I assure you, that is not the attitude I woke up with routinely in my drinking years!

And I did have a great day! I drove down to North Bend. The report was well received and I enjoyed the wonderful fellowship we have in District 8. I drove home and got to sleep in my own bed... didn't even have to take any naps coming or going. And what a feeling I had the whole day... that powerful feeling that many of the trusted servants in this room have had... when we take on a service commitment, see it through until completion, and then feeling what it feels like... to be the sober person who was able to meet such a commitment. These are feelings that are much more valuable than feeling good because someone likes me... or feeling good because others think that I'm doing a good job.

And what was that job? To share the information I was given in New York and relate it to my personal experience and the history of this amazing thing called... the General Service Conference. I did it 21 times during 12 weekends... in 20 different towns for 32 different districts, driving a total of 4,367 miles. Each time I gave that report, 90-150 minutes, I learned and relearned the lessons I had been given. Who were my teachers? You! You and the present and past delegates of the US and Canada, You, who gave me this opportunity. You, the groups of Oregon, who sent 7th Tradition contributions which were then used to pay my mileage and send me to PRAASA, the Forum and the Pacific Northwest Conference. I have attempted... to be of service... to the groups, districts and members of Oregon Area, but I have no way of knowing if... or how many... were actually helped. I do know this: Your love in action, combined with my willingness to serve, has been a vehicle of healing and freedom in my life, and I thank you all from the bottom of my heart.

What a life you have given me!!!

Hello Oregon Area! My name is Gus P. and I am an alcoholic. I'm currently serving as your alcoholic Treasurer. My sobriety date is 12/1/93 and my home group is the Downtown AM Group in Eugene.

The General Assembly at Reed College seems like it was last week. Where did the time go? Let's see if I can figure it out. The Tuesday Night Men's Step Workshop continues, with as many as 16 guys still participating. We are maintaining our brisk pace, making steady progress as we trudge along. After ONLY 77 weeks, we are taking our Fifth Step. I attended the Men's Retreat at Sky Camp the weekend of September 22<sup>nd</sup>. In October, I attended the February 2007 Assembly Planning Committee meeting and a Potluck Breakfast Fundraiser on the 21<sup>st</sup>, where we raised \$651.00 for the February 2007 Host Committee. I also attended local performances of "Chicago" and "Enchanted April" and loved both shows. In November, I was a panelist for the District 19 Workshop on "What Makes a Great Meeting" and attended the Assembly Planning Committee meeting, where I was selected as the dinner speaker for the February 2007 Assembly.

Enough about me, you say! What about our finances? So what is the state of our Area Treasury? Simply stated, "We still have money!" The Oregon Area ended its third quarter with a balance of \$35,712.55. We closed the September Assembly with a bank balance of \$25,009.44, having written \$10,703.11 worth of checks during the Assembly. Income from all sources for the current reporting period (9/15/06 to 11/16/06) was \$10,628.30, which includes group contributions of \$9,826.30. Thank you for your continuing support. District 14 sent us \$102.00 as Net Assembly Proceeds for the May 2006 Assembly. We also received a \$200.00 contribution from District 29. Thank you Districts 14 and 29. We had expenses of \$10,389.46 for the current reporting period. Included in our current expenses is a \$300.00 advance to District 17 for the May 2007 Assembly. We enter this Assembly with a current balance of \$35,951.39, which does include six outstanding checks valued at \$625. And thus, "We have money!"

In the spirit of providing the Area with useful information regarding its finances, your Treasurer offers the following data. Group contributions for this reporting period were 37.7% less than the prior quarter; however this quarter is our shortest of the year, only two months long. When compared to the same quarter last year, group contributions are down by 7.1%. For our current year to date our group contributions are only 1.7% higher than the same period last year. Total contributions and income from other sources are up 5.1% from last year, with about 90% of that increase due to increased Net Assembly Proceeds. Of note is the fact that our total expenses for the current year to date are 17.1% higher than for the same period last year. We are continuing to overspend our current level of contributions this year. Our fiscal year ends on November 30<sup>th</sup> and using a crystal ball I found in the finance room at the last Assembly plus our very own financial records, it is likely that this year expenses will exceed income by about \$3000 based on our current obligations only. Please consider this information and inform your Groups accordingly. Thank you.

Please remind your Group Treasurers to mail their contributions to the Area Treasury address listed in the Area Roster, and to include the group's name and service number with their donations.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the Oregon Area. This is my last report to you as your Treasurer and I can hardly believe that four years have gone by since I first heard James Jeffries tell me to stop socializing in the big room and get to my job in the finance room. He said that even a social butterfly like me could learn to resign himself to being of real service to the Assembly and learn to love it too. He was right! Thank you James. Thank you Kaye for mentoring me. Thank you Dale, Ron, Patrick, Murray, Les, Jack and Pam for all your help. These last four years with all of you have been absolutely wonderful and truly a gift.

That is a 13.5% increase in groups contributing to the Area Treasury. I have submitted this report to the Assembly and included copies in the information packets provided to the DCM's. If you have any questions about the report or need an additional copy, please see me at the Assembly; or email me (refer to the Area Directory or the Oregon Area website).

Please continue to mail your donations to our Bend post office box; and **identify your check or money order with your group name, number and district.** This information is important in differentiating groups with similar names. I want to make sure that contributions are credited to the right group in the right district. Please let me know if you see any errors in your group contributions on the report. You will note on the report that some group numbers are indicated by a "?". This means I was unable to identify the group number at all. If you recognize your group name and can give me the group number, I would appreciate it. And if you notice a group assigned to an incorrect district, tell me about that, too. Accurate records are my goal.

If you are a DCM and need an additional \$25.00 for DCM travel, but have not yet requested it, please see me during the assembly. Past delegates who need funds to defray travel expenses to the assembly and have not yet requested it, should also see me.

The next time you run into any alcoholic with special needs do what my sponsor did with me. Look them in the eyes and smile, then softly say to them get in the truck kid.

This means that 4 times a year I go to New York to serve on the committee that takes into consideration all of the requests from our fellowship for new or revised AA literature.

October was a very exciting month for our committee and I hope AA as a whole. For those of you that haven't seen it, I have a few copies of the newly revised pamphlet "Too Young?". "Too Young?" is a pamphlet designed as a comic book directed toward the teen or pre-teen alcoholic. The last time this pamphlet was revised was in 1988 so as you can imagine this revision was long over due. If any of you would like to see this pamphlet I have a few copies, but they will not be available to order through GSO until we have used our stock of the pre-existing version. So get out there and do PI work in your schools and youth treatment centers and help rocket young peoples AA into the year 2006.

We are currently working on revising the pamphlet "AA for the Native North American". Letters have been mailed to Conference members, literature committee chairs, and Intergroup and Central offices throughout the US and Canada in order to solicit Native North American Stories. Story

solicitation information is also in the October-November issue of Box 4-5-9 and will be included in future issues of the AA Grapevine. Attendees that expressed interest at the recent Native American Forum in Banning, CA have also been contacted. If you, or anyone you know is Native American and in recovery we would love to have your story. Feel free to contact me anytime this weekend. My phone number is accurate in the roster, but my email is not.

Other projects that are well underway are the Spanish Language Third Edition Big Book and the new design of our Recovery, Unity and Service pamphlets. You can see the new-design of the pamphlets in the 2007 Conference-Approved Literature Catalogue.

Outside of committee work, we had a guest for the weekend. Tom H. who is the current Archivist for the International Conference of Young People in AA came to NY to turn over the ICYPAA archives to GSO. Tom and Amy, the GSO Archivist, spent the weekend sifting through boxes of ICYPAA history. It was a very emotional time for me personally because of my own experience finding other young alcoholics in a world full of AA that told me I was too young to have a chair here. I was able to see letters written to the first ICYPAA committee by Bill W. and Rockefeller Jr. showing their love and support for "the next generation" of Alcoholics Anonymous. I am so pleased that this part of AA's history has made it to our General Service Office.

In addition to serving the Trustees Committee on Literature, I was asked to serve on the Sub-Committee for the Young Peoples Videos on the Trustees Committee on Public Information. We started the process of writing the guidelines for the PI videos as well as began conversation about how to make videos for all alcoholics available on the world wide web. It is a very exciting time as we look at changes in technology and possibility balanced with the care and importance of our traditions regarding anonymity. In this changing world, how can we best carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic? All I can say is thank God everything in AA happens slowly and by group conscience. Above all I have the sense of how present a higher power is in this thing we call AA.

Thank you all for allowing me to be of service to this fellowship that has given this lost, dying, 14 year old alcoholic a life beyond her wildest dreams.

Things are happening around the District 23. In September we had our general elections for the District, where we elected 12 new trusted servants. Among those elected were chairpersons for the newly approved PI, CPC and CTF service committee's as well as three alternate DCMs (that is two more alternates than the district previously had), all of those elected rotated into their positions in October. Among the first challenges faced was the creation of budgets for positions and committees that had not previously existed. But as always in this program there is a wealth of experience available from others to help us through.

There has been some concern around the District about of all things money! I know it is unusual for us around AA to be concerned about money, but we are. The concern is that we have too much rather than too little (that will be next month's topic). Before you all start volunteering to help us spend it, I should say that the funds in question have been budgeted to a specific AA purpose just not spent yet. I have been working with the treasurer and others to present this more clearly to the groups and members of the District. The traditions tell me that it is "Okay" for treasuries to collect funds beyond prudent reserve as long as it is for a stated AA purpose. "Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surly destroy us as futile disputes over property, money and authority" But we do it anyway, oh well. It is money after all.

We continue to actively look a re-districting in 23. We now have 70 +/-groups within District 23. We cover about 300 square miles (20 miles long and 15 miles wide). The communities of West Linn, Wilsonville, Sherwood, Tigard, Tualatin, Lake Grove, Lake Oswego and SW Portland are within the district current boundaries. Should the groups in the District approve it we will likely be making a motion at the February Assembly to divide the District into thirds - Stay tuned. If any of the other Districts are considering such action I would be happy to talk with you about our process so far.

My name is Lizz and I am an alcoholic. My sobriety date is 7-21-95 and my homegroup is the Friday Night Young Peoples Meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. I am currently serving as DCM for district 24.

Everything has been back to normal at district 24. The post assembly host depression lasted only momentarily and we launched straight into a brand new problem. We have too much money. Our groups continue to rise in attendance and with it 7<sup>th</sup> tradition contributions. After 3 months of discussion the groups of district 24 decided that since our primary purpose is to carry the message to the alcoholic that still suffers, they wanted to give most of the excess funds to the Portland Accessibility Committee. In the Portland metro area, the accessibility committee is not supported by our area intergroup and we have seen an enormous need in the deaf community for alcoholics anonymous. There is one group in the district that has ASL interpretation weekly, but due to lack of funds interpretation was not possible for nearly 4 weeks. We would like to ask that group in the metro area consider passing a pink can to help support our deaf alcoholic friends in need. We have two deaf treatment centers that feed into Portland AA. One in Salem, OR and one in Vancouver, WA. As a result we find many deaf alcoholics looking for sobriety.

As usual district 24 meetings are active. Currently we work with Letty Owings, JDH, Rosemont, Morrison Group, Portland Adventist Hospital and De Paul. We have made another trip to Lewiston, Idaho. We continue to support WACYPA in their unity and outreach efforts as well as Portland's own Days of Sobriety conference. We also have a brand new meeting in our district called the Belmont Group that meets at Muddy Waters coffee shop on Belmont at 7 p.m. on Sunday nights. There are already more than 50 people in attendance weekly and we are very excited to have this new energy in our district.

I am sorry to say I missed Eric's port conference report, but I was serving you in another way. This isn't part of my district report, but I am really excited to be serving our fellowship in this way and I have the mic, so you have to listen. I will make this brief, since I will be giving a full report tomorrow, but I just wanted you to know that I have copies of the pamphlet "Too Young?" for you to look at. 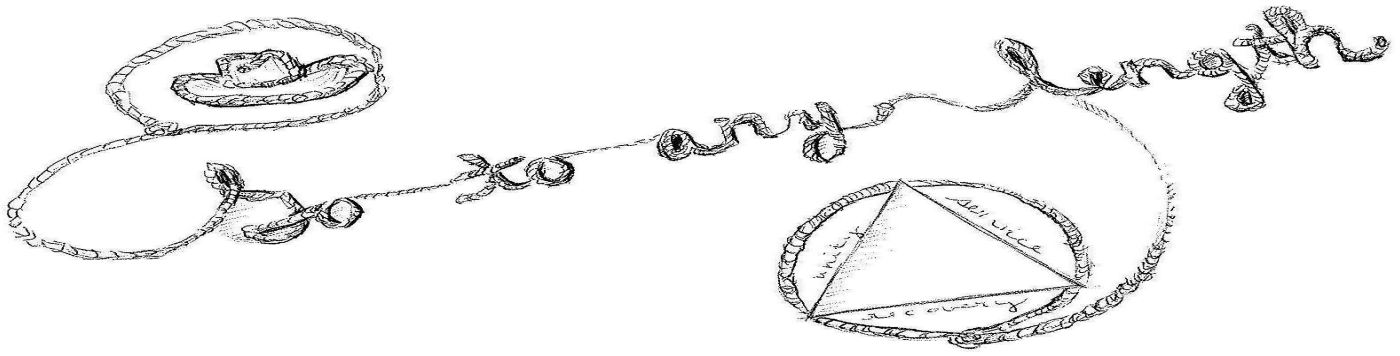
